BRINGING SMALLFORD STATION BACK TO LIFE

SSAWHS AGM and Special Presentations on 26 October 2018 - a great evening had by all!

The Smallford Station & Alban Way Heritage Society (SSAWHS) held their AGM, as well as a special presentation on 'The Varying Fortunes of the Hatfield-St Albans Railway' by SSAWHS committee member Alastair Cameron, on Friday 26 October 2018.

Introducing the Society

The Society members were delighted to find so many newcomers in attendance.

For their and everyone's benefit, Jeff Lewis provided the following useful background to the Smallford Station and Alban Way Heritage Society (SSAWHS):

- 1. We've been active for nearly 7 years researching the history of Smallford Station, the Hatfield-St Albans Railway (which opened 153 years ago and closed 50 years ago this year), and the impact these had on the surrounding communities. We started as the 'Bringing the History of Smallford Station Alive' Project Group, initially funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund (without whom we would probably not have existed).
- 18 months ago we became 'The Smallford Station & Alban Way Heritage Society' (SSAWHS). One of our major hopes and aspirations is to renovate and restore Smallford Station (a Grade II Listed Building) to create a Community Heritage Centre. For various reasons beyond our control, this is currently 'in abeyance'.





 - b) Alastair Cameron a founding member who has many passions, including Railway History, plus, as a result of his work for our Society, has become an excellent railway station modelmaker!




6. Like the 26 October event, everything the Society provides is free – although we happily welcome voluntary contributions to the aid the work of our Society.

Greenspace Action Plan

World War I Use of the Railway

Despite extensive efforts, the SSAWHS Chairman, Jeff Lewis (JL) reports there has been no progress on the matter of the role of the railway in wartime. Listing of Smallford Station

We have submitted a Freedom of Information Act request concerning the exact definition of the listing of Smallford Station to St Albans District Council. This has been referred to the Cambridge office of Historic England - and we are waiting for their response.

National Archives

We are currently making enquiries with the National Archives to see if any new material relating to the railway has been released in the last couple of years.

The Hatfield & St Albans Branch of the GNR

A lot of interest was shown in Roger Taylor and Brian Anderson's book, 'The History of the Hatfield and St Albans Branch of the Great Northern Railway', at our recent AGM. We - along with Roger Taylor himself - would be delighted if the book, which is currently out of print, were to be republished. In fact, our understanding is that Roger Taylor now has enough material that the book could be 'twice as thick'!

Meanwhile - and as an early Christmas cracker to all our readers! - we have the pleasure of publishing the first of three separate papers on the railway written by Roger Taylor under the heading of 'Taylor's Tales'. The first such tale is titled 'After the Line Close in 1969', and can be read on pages 6-8.

The next two papers ('Railway Memories' and 'The Branch Line on Film') will be published in our forthcoming Newsletters.



TAYLOR'S TALES:

After the Line Closure in 1969

After the Hatfield-St Albans line was finally closed in 1969, it was sad indeed to see the rails being taken up by two men and a bulldozer, an operation that took three months to complete. Only a short section was left intact – from Lemsford Road Halt to Hatfield Station - presumably to be used as a long siding. This didn't last long and was soon removed. An attempt to re-open the line by a preservation group was started in July 1969, there was a meeting at St Albans Town Hall (which I attended) and a few lines in the Herts Advertiser but it was all too late. The rails had been lifted.

Despite the closure of the branch line, I was still determined to delve into the history of the line and try to discover as many photographs as I could. In pre-website days this wasn't easy. It became a real labour of love and very difficult - a lot easier these days! My contemporary notes record lots of requests for photos and information (always sent a SAE) many of whom went unanswered.

In 1972 I moved from the area to Cambridgeshire but carried on with my research. My parents and brother still lived in St Albans and kept me up to date with any developments and articles in the local press and I visited the remains of the line on many occasions as my parents lived nearby.

At the time (1970) I wrote:-

"In the very near future it seems likely that parts of the line will be built on, one possible future for the branch would be to turn it into a public footpath but this seems unlikely to happen. In a few years nothing will be left of the St Albans to Hatfield line".

Through the years there were different plans for the track-bed including turning it into a road - in retrospect it would have made a great guided bus way! In the 1980's there were many interesting articles in the Herts Advertiser and Hertfordshire Countryside magazine about the line and people's memories of it in its heyday. It seemed interest in the line was re-awakening.

Histories of local railway branch lines were now being produced and in 1975 a book titled 'Forgotten Railways - Chilterns and Cotswolds' by R Davies and M D Grant was published. This included a marvellous chapter on the Hatfield-St Albans branch with many details of opening and closure dates, logs of the last passenger train, locomotives etc. No photographs, unfortunately.


To my knowledge this was the first account of the history of the line apart from articles in the various railway magazines. This was my incentive to publish a book on the branch.

In c. 1985 somebody wrote to me stating that another person was researching the history with the aim of publishing - his name was Brian Anderson. Brian lived locally and was an active member of The Colney Heath Local History Society. Brian was very knowledgeable and quite an academic and, without his input the book would almost certainly not have been published. We were quickly introduced and began researching thoroughly the history of the line, regularly visiting the Public Records Office at Kew and the National Railway Museum at York. These turned out to be a mine of information.

A final draft for the book was drawn up in 1986 and it was published in 1988. Local bookshops did us proud with their window displays and the book sold out very quickly.







Figure 4: Brian's & Roger's book, and the flyer publicising it.

A talk to a local railway society produced a record attendance! Now people were becoming interested.

Meanwhile the track-bed was at last converted to a footpath/cycleway and opened as The Smallford Trail in 1985. Some parts had been opened before in Hatfield but the whole route was not ready until mid-1986.

In 1987 I walked the whole length of the footpath and took many "before and after" photographs.

During this time my brother, Peter Taylor, was researching the history of St Albans City FC and weekly visited the National Newspaper Library at Colindale. He came across numerous news stories regarding the branch - accidents, events, etc - that proved to be very useful and added to my archive.

Then, in 2012 after a 'tip off' from my brother, I contacted and met Jeff Lewis and was delighted to hear of his plans for 'Bringing the History of Smallford Station to Life' project.

The rest, as they say, is history.




